

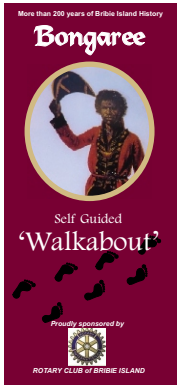
The waterfront walkway at Bongaree on Bribie Island provides a wonderful panorama of the many activities on the Pumicestone Passage, set against the spectacular backdrop of the Glasshouse Mountains. It is a great walk for people of all ages to do at any time. Walking, cycling or jogging along a wide flat concrete wheelchair friendly path that wanders amongst the trees and gardens above the beach.

The pleasure of this experience has changed little in the 210 years since Matthew Flinders first landed with Bongaree in 1799. Sixteen bronze Heritage Plaques installed along this walk tell some of the fascinating events that have shaped the rich history of this -

Cradle Site of Queensland

You can start from either end, or indeed, from the middle by the Jetty, and view all 16 plaques in an easy one hour walk.

You will be surprised at some of the fascinating facts you may learn, and certainly come to appreciate the lifestyle that existed here, back in the early days.



There are also places of historic interest away from the waterfront at Bongaree, and another free Self Guided Walkabout brochure can be obtained from the Bribie Island Information Centre, public library and other outlets.
